Scientists have placed animals into different groups in order to make it easier for people to identify them and help understand their behaviors. Two of the animals groups we will be learning about are

Canines and Felines.



Canines are mammals (*animals with fur*) that are related to dogs.

Felines are mammals that are related to cats.

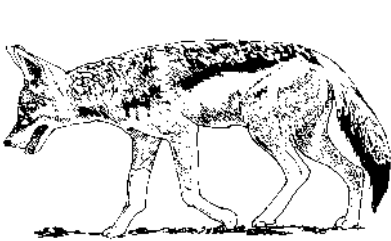


One difference between the two groups is that felines have sharp claws that will stay hidden in their paws until they are ready to use them. Canines' claws are always out.

Draw an X across the 4 animals that are not felines or canines.



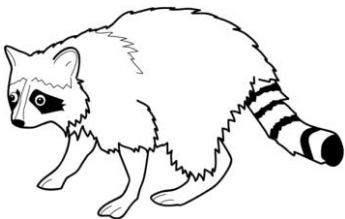
